# Now on sale "Aoi Matsuri 2025" paid seating for festival parade



The highlight of the festival is a grand procession, called the Roto-no-gi. Around 500 participants dressed in elegant Heian-period (794-1185) court attire parade along an 8kilometer route from the Kyoto Imperial Palace to Shimogamo Shrine and finally Kamigamo Shrine. The procession features women in vibrant jūnihitoe robes, horseback warriors, oxdrawn carts, and more—offering a vivid recreation of a Heian court scene. 
